Charity Check-in



When someone asks, "what is a community foundation?" we used to say "we make grants to charities to make communities better". But we have evolved and grown over the years and today our answer is different. Today we say, "we make communities

better by supporting the non-profit sector, sometimes with grants and often with other tools. "

The Charity Check-in served as the launch of our effort to support capacity building in the non-profit sector. If we can build the skills, knowledge, and capacity of the sector, we will be helping them make our communities better. Without our non-profit community partners, the foundation cannot accomplish its goals of building strong, healthy and vibrant communities where everyone belongs.

About the Charity Development Fund

In early 2023, we launched the Charity Development Fund to help create a stronger and better-connected charitable sector in our region.

The Fund was set up to provide opportunities for support beyond our grant making activities, such as:

- critical organizational development work
- governance
- strategic planning
- financial diversification

Activities supported by this Fund will be undertaken in close consultation with local charities and non-profits – including those who attended our Charity Check-In event.

100 Men Who Care

The members of 100 Men Who Care demonstrate how the power of many small gifts can collectively make a significant impact. The



group kicked off another year of learning and giving in February, and over the course of 2023, **members generously donated a total of \$23,800** to support charities and non-profits working to make our region more healthy, caring, inclusive and thriving.

Community Services Recovery Fund

The Community Foundation not only uses its own financial resources to support organizations; through its participation in the Community Foundations of Canada network, it acts as the conduit for many external funding programs. Such is the case with the **Community Services Recovery Fund**, an investment by the Government of Canada to support charities and non-profits to adapt for pandemic recovery. **We delivered a total of \$306,000 in funding to eight organizations in our region** through this Recovery Fund.

Donor Check-ins

At the start of each year, we report back to our donors on the activities of their Fund.

Some donors choose a specific cause or charity to support indefinitely. Others prefer a donor-advised fund, allowing them to decide yearly where the money goes. This flexibility lets donors, or their families, adapt their giving to emerging community needs or causes.

For instance, through their Fund held with the Community Foundation, the Okanagan Fest-of-Ale Society chose to direct their annual contributions to six food banks in the region.

Planning of Investment Readiness Program

The 3rd round of the Government of Canada's Investment Readiness Program (IRP) was launched and administered by an Okanagan Valley partnership between the North, Central and South Okanagan Similkameen foundations. This year's funding, totalling \$267,000 for our valley, was granted to four agencies throughout the region to support their work to develop sustainable business models by blending social enterprise and traditional charitable activities. In total, this program has provided over \$450,000 in funding to our region.

100 more homes

The Foundation is proud to participate in 100 More Homes Penticton, along with many other community organizations. The collective provides important collaboration opportunities, advocacy, and planning to support the development of a more inclusive and equitable housing plan for our communities. While winter shelters, emergency shelters and other efforts to support the unhoused often receive the most attention, it's important to remember that our communities need more housing of all forms.

Vital Signs Community Survey

Vital Signs has become an important tool for community foundations across the country to **measure the well-being of their communities** and report those findings back to spark discussion and action. The community foundation kicked off this year's reporting process with a community survey which received almost 1,000 responses. The information gathered from the survey formed part of the final Vital Signs report which was released in October.

We asked survey respondents to identify the best things about living in the South Okanagan Similkameen:

Climate: 52.7%

Natural environment: 48.3% Friends & family: 33.8%

Locally grown food: 33.0%

The event was capped off with a toast to the various community builders and leaders the Foundation has had the honour of working with over the 30 years of our service.

Community Foundations of Canada Conference

Canada is unique in the strength of its 200-strong network of community foundations. Every two years, community foundations from across Canada and around the world gather for a national conference to learn, share and grow. Our staff was there in full force, taking part in a whole host of learning and networking sessions. This year's conference focused on (re)building connections post-COVID, learning about significant changes to the way charities operate under the Income Tax Act, and discovering the many creative ways community foundations are finding to make their communities better.



Foundation Bursary Program

The Community Foundation has long been involved in supporting the education goals of students of all ages and backgrounds: by managing scholarship and bursary funds delivered by other organizations, and through its annual Foundation bursary program.

Our Foundation bursary program cycle started in April. A three-month application and evaluation process — including a review by a committee of community members — culminated in the announcement of 24 bursary award recipients in early July. These students, pursuing studies in fine arts, humanities, sciences and trades, shared more than \$49,000 from 10 bursary funds.

Neighbourhood Small Grants (NSG)

NSG supported 70+ projects with grants up to \$500. From block parties to cultural events, neighbours celebrated where they live.

In 2023, the NSG program continued to turn ideas into action, offering grants for individuals to enhance community connections. NSG promotes diverse neighbourhood initiatives, cultivating resilient and interconnected communities through events like:

- Neighbourhood Pancake Breakfast in Summerland to welcome Ukrainian refugee family
- Youth-inspired revamp of a skate park in Princeton
- Dark Sky Movie Night in Naramata

Co-funded by CFSOS, Vancouver Foundation, and the City of Penticton, NSG projects were delivered in partnerships with local governments and the Regional District. CFSOS also coordinates and facilitates with eight NSG delivery partners in the BC interior, amplifying the program's transformative impact province wide.







Food Security Conversations

Over its 30-year history, the Community Foundation has forged many strong ties with local community organizations. As a result, we are well positioned to convene those organizations and facilitate strategic conversations about critical social issues.

Such is the case with our role in **bringing Penticton's food** access programs together to talk about the state of food security in the city and work on collaborative responses to the ever-growing need for their services. The first meeting of this group took place in July, with a follow-up meeting in October and plans for further meetings in 2024. The work underscores our commitment to addressing the challenges facing our local food system – a commitment which resulted in food security being identified as an impact focus in our most recent strategic plan.

Table Talks - Pilot Project

kinSHIFT Table Talks is a grassroots initiative that sparks individuals to engage in courageous conversations about Indigenous-specific racism and reflect on their personal responsibility to advance reconciliation efforts. **It invites everyone to participate, requiring only a willingness to learn and desire to create meaningful change.**

Equipped with a user-friendly toolkit of resources and online training, over twenty volunteers hosted discussions throughout the year. "Table Talks serves as a stepping stone towards cultivating right relationships, layering the groundwork for genuine, authentic, and sustainable actions", said Kelly Terbasket, the co-founder and creative director at IndigenEYEZ/ kinSHIFT. CFSOS concluded its two-year pilot project with kinSHIFT and will continue to support organizations to participate in Table Talks, reaffirming our commitment to reconciliation through vital conversations within community.

As one participant reflected, "Table Talks helped me to reflect on and express my views, and without having to get into a place of heated discussion. Now I feel like I can get curious, ask good questions, and support folks who are unaware, with more awareness".

100 Men & Women support Wildfire Relief

The 2023 wildfire season was a devastating reminder of the destructive power of natural disasters – and a testament to the power of communities coming together in times of crisis. 100 Men and 100 Women Who Care were both part of the incredible response community members had in support of those affected by wildfires. The groups elected to direct their donations that month to wildfire relief funds with the Shuswap Community Foundation, Central Okanagan Foundation and our own Community Foundation's Community Response Fund.

Grant Writing Workshops

2023 saw the return of in-person grant writing workshops across our region. Our Grants & Community Initiatives staff presented sessions in Summerland, Keremeos, Oliver and Princeton during September and early October. The workshops offered "tips and tricks" from a grantmaker's prospective for crafting a compelling grant proposal. The sessions are an example of how the Community Foundation can provide "support beyond the cheque" by helping to build grant-seeking capacity in the non-profit sector.

Vees Community Heroes



The Vees Community Heroes Program was reignited for the 2023/24 hockey season. A partnership between the Community Foundation and the Penticton Vees junior hockey team, the program recognizes and supports local charities at home games throughout the season. The program not only provides vital financial support to community organizations, but also shines a spotlight on the incredible work being done by individuals and groups in Penticton.

Charity Social

Through our Charity Check-In, we heard from charities that opportunities to connect with each other was important. We responded by hosting a Charity Social, where staff from organizations could talk and network with each other without an agenda.

Community-run Clinic

Keeping a walk-in clinic open is not "normal practice" for a community foundation, but when community partners approached us about the crisis that would result from the impending closure of the Apple Plaza Walk-in Clinic we knew we had to act. By taking on the head lease in partnership with Community Futures, the Community Foundation worked with local doctors to ensure the clinic only lost one day of operations. Between the reopening of the clinic in October and year end the clinic saw more than 3,000 patients, most of whom did not have a family doctor. Imagine the strain on the health care system (and the patients!) if the clinic had been allowed to close as planned!

Pen-High Leadership Class Halloween Fundraiser

We teamed up with the Pen High Leadership class to organize a Halloween haunted house and block party at the Penticton Youth Centre. This collaborative effort involved many hands, including Greyback Construction constructing the maze, Total Restoration crews clearing the space, and sponsorships from Norval Rentals and Castanet. The basement of the Foundry was transformed into a spooky maze that delighted over 300 kids, teens, and families.



Non-Profit Excellence Award

CFSOS received the Not-for-Profit Excellence Award at the **36th Annual Penticton & Wine Country Chamber of Commerce** Business Excellence Awards. We're honoured and grateful for the recognition. Our staff and volunteers work tirelessly to make a difference, and this acknowledgment is truly exciting. We want to emphasize that this achievement would not have been possible without the longstanding support of our many community partners and generous donors. Our collective collaboration and commitment is instrumental, and we look forward to continuing our work together for a better community.



2024 Foundation grants announced

Following the Community Foundation's annual grant program is a key vehicle for our delivery of financial resources to charities and non-profits. In December, after an application and review process that began in August, we announced a total of \$260,185 in discretionary grants to 36 organizations across the South Okanagan Similkameen, including Princeton & District Community Services Society, Osoyoos & District Arts Council, Oliver Seniors Centre Society, Penticton Soupateria and Neighbourlink Summerland.




Grants by \$ distributed
